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# A Look Back in History


As a result of the Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1962, a study of transportation in the Abilene urban area began in late 1964. The study covered ten basic elements and resulted in the publication of a two volume report.

An agreement between the City of Abilene and the State of Texas was executed on January 23, 1969. The agreement was revised on March 30, 1973 and provided the guidelines for the organization and function of the study. It also assigned responsibility for each of the ten basic study elements to the city, state or county. The 1973 agreement established a group structure to provide overall transportation policy guidance for the planning activities. The group structure was initially made up of two committees. It evolved in response to changes in legislation and contractual agreements, becoming a single committee with both voting and non-voting members. The group adopted the name Abilene MPO Transportation Policy Board in 1993. It continues to act as the forum for cooperative transportation planning, decision-making, and overall transportation planning planning

responsibilities for the urbanized area.

In 2010 the MPO underwent a management review and as a result a Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) was established. The TAC provides professional and technical support to the Policy Board.

# **TxDOTs Info Spot**

Since Nov. 7, 2000, fatalities resulting from vehicle crashes on Texas roadways have numbered almost 67,000. The leading causes of fatalities continue to be failure to stay in one lane, alcohol and speed. Last year, in the Abilene area, the leading causes of car crash fatalities were unsafe speed and alcohol.

Earlier this year, during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, traffic levels on Texas highways dropped nearly 44 percent in some parts of the state. This decrease in traffic encouraged TxDOT to think the horrific streak might finally come to an end. Instead, the death rate was unchanged, even with fewer drivers on Texas roads.

To decrease the chances of roadway crashes and fatalities, TxDOT reminds drivers to:

- Buckle seatbelts all passengers need to be buckled
- Pay attention put phones away and avoid distractions
- Never drink and drive or do drugs and drive -get a sober ride home
- Drive the speed limit obey speed limits and drive slower when weather conditions warrant

Mayor of the City of Abilene



#### TxDOTs Info Spot (continued)

The map below shows crash data from 2019 for the Abilene area. In 2019 there were 2,996 crashes with 9 of those being fatal crashes. The red dots indicate the location of a traffic related fatality. Even one red dot is too many. You can help #EndTheStreakTX!

TxDOT has set a target goal of zero fatalities on Texas roadways by 2050. One of the ways they plan to achieve this goal is through the use of Performance Measures. The Abilene MPO is committed to plan and program projects compatible with the achievement of TxDOTs target goal. To accomplish that the Abilene MPO drafted a Resolution adopting TxDOTs targets for the Safety Performance Measures (PM1). The Performance Measures (PM1) establishes statewide safety targets in the Strategic Highway Safety Plan for the number of fatalities, rate of fatalities, number of serious injuries, rate of serious injuries, and non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries. The Abilene MPO will work closely with TxDOT and other agencies to improve safety on our roadways as we work towards the Road to Zero together.

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

## Are you... In the know with the MPO?

Did you know that there are over 400 Metropolitan Planning Organizations throughout the United States? Though the saying goes that "everything is bigger in Texas," it's actually the state of Florida that has the most MPOs. Florida currently has 27 MPOs with Texas not far behind having 23 MPOs. Rhode Island has the fewest with just 1 MPO to cover the entire state. The Census Bureau designates a new list of Urbanized Areas every 10 years following the conclusion of each Census. As a result of the 2010 Census there were 36 new Urbanized Areas identified throughout the United States. Each one of the new areas were required to establish and staff a new MPO or merge with an existing one. The U.S. Census Bureau shows the Abilene area covers 110.6 square miles. The Abilene Metropolitan Planning Organization's study area includes the Cities of Abilene, Impact, and Tye. It also covers the communities of Caps, Elmdale, Hamby, and Potosi. Additionally, it encompasses the entire Lake Fort Phantom area in the southeastern corner of Jones County along with some rural areas in Taylor County that are adjacent to the Abilene city limits. Don't forget, MPO Policy Board meetings are open to the public! Members of the public are encouraged to join meetings and voice your concerns and opinions on transportation. You can watch MPO Policy Board meetings from the comfort of your own home. 
